Introduction

Rationale for the Resource Manual

The Pennsylvania Child Welfare Training Program created the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender & Questioning Resource Manual as a guide for Child Welfare Professionals that have attended the “202-3: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Questioning (LGBTQ) Youth in the Child Welfare System” training. Workers are strongly encouraged to use this manual as a reference tool when working with young adults, youth, and families.

In 2016, four percent of American Gallup poll responders self-identified as LGBT (Gates, 2017). Among millennials, that number was slightly over seven percent. Based on these statistics it is estimated that more than seven percent of adolescents encountered by child welfare workers and other human services professionals, identify as gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, or questioning. For child welfare workers and other human services professionals, this means that possibly ten percent of the adolescents that we encounter could be gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, or questioning youths. In order to best assist these youths, child welfare workers need to know the proper definition of terms such as gender identity, sexual behavior, and sexual orientation. They also must have an understanding of their own values and biases, and how these values and biases might influence their behavior toward these youths; the issues and challenges that face these youths; and the resources and assistance that may be available to help these youths.

Recommended Uses of the Resource Manual

This manual gives Child Welfare Professionals additional information about lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and questioning youth. The manual should preferably be used by persons introduced to the manual with the *202-3: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Questioning Youth in the Child Welfare System* training.

This manual provides information about agencies, organizations, and committees throughout Pennsylvania that will assist child welfare professionals in serving youth. The information provided includes various contact options ranging from e-mail and web address to phone numbers and physical addresses.

Terminology

The definitions provided on Handout #5 are a foundation of knowledge and starting points for discussions. Please remember, however, not to impose any of these words as labels upon LGBTQ youth. It is vital to ask each youth how they self-identify and/or about language that makes them feel safe and respected. If they choose to avoid self-identifying terms, honor their decision. This will clearly indicate each youth's right to be whatever they perceive themselves to be and to be safe. 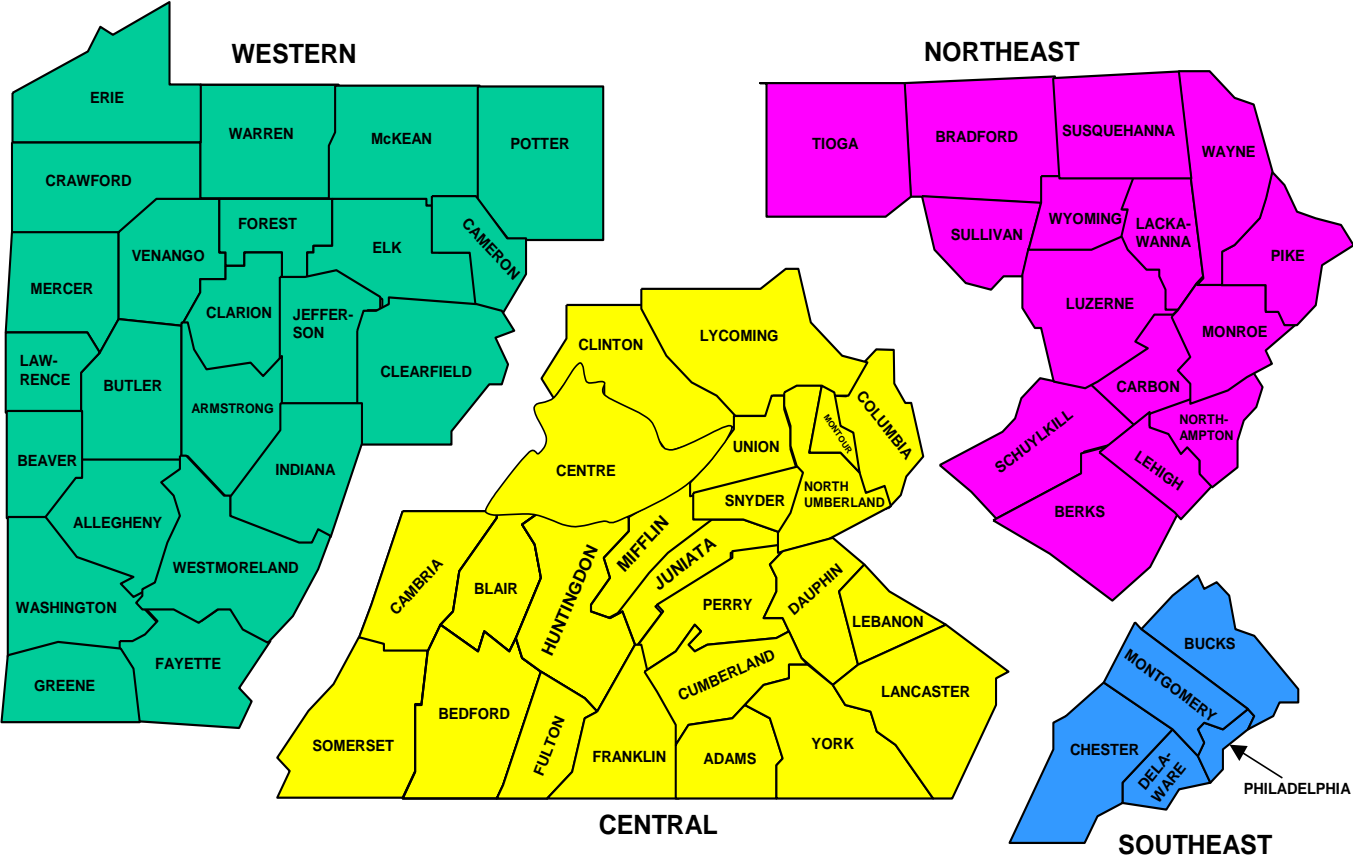

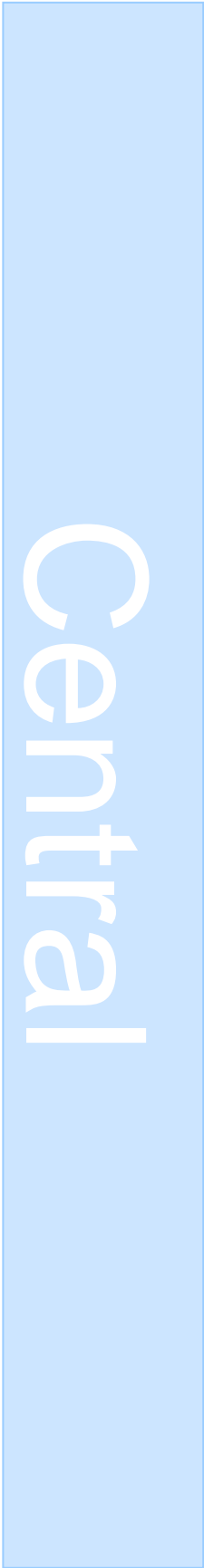

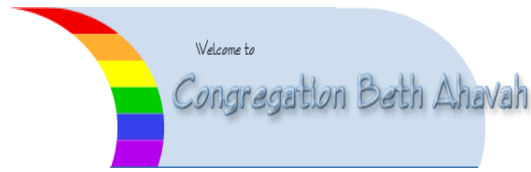

The organization eventually developed into a funded organization where it began providing health and wellness services for Black lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender individuals. Currently the organization has 6 staff and provides HIV testing services, support groups and health and wellness navigation services for Black men who have sex with men (MSM) who are at high risk for acquiring HIV.

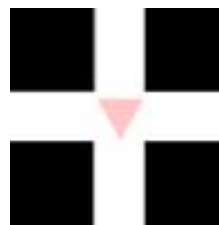

AHA Committee on Lesbian and Gay History Awards

The Committee on Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender History awards five prizes for outstanding work in lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgendered, transsexual, and queer history; prize descriptions are below. Calls for prizes are announced in the early summer of each year; submissions are due to prize committee members in the fall. The prizes are awarded each year in early January at the annual meeting of the American Historical Association. The Boswell and Nestle Prizes are awarded in January of odd-numbered years for work published or written in the prior two years. The Bérubé, Lorde, and Sprague Prizes are awarded in January of even-numbered years for work produced, published, or written in the prior two years.

Each prize comes with an award of \$200. The CLGBTH funds the prizes, with the exception of the Bérubé Prize, which is underwritten by the GLBT Historical Society in San Francisco.

The John Boswell Prize for an outstanding book on lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgendered, transsexual, and/or queer history published in English. (Odd-numbered years, covering previous two years.)

The Joan Nestle Prize for an outstanding paper on lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgendered, transsexual, and/or queer history completed in English by an undergraduate student. (Odd-numbered years, covering previous two years.) The undergraduate paper prize is funded through a special fund established by CLGBTH's lifetime members.

The Gregory Sprague Prize for an outstanding published or unpublished paper, article, book chapter, or dissertation chapter on lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgendered, transsexual, and/or queer history completed in English by a graduate student. (Even-numbered years, covering previous two years.)

The Audre Lorde Prize for an outstanding article on lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgendered, transsexual, and/or queer history published in English. (Even-numbered years, covering previous two years.)

The Allan Bérubé Prize for outstanding work in public or community-based lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and/or queer history. (Even-numbered years, covering previous two years.) The Bérubé Prize is underwritten by the GLBT Historical Society in San Francisco, CA.

These need-based scholarships are awarded to students who are able to do academic work at the college or university level or are enrolled in a trade or technical program and who are active in the progressive movement. Early recipients worked for civil rights, against McCarthyism and for peace in Vietnam. Recent grantees have been active in the struggle against racism, sexism, homophobia and other forms of oppression; building the movement for economic justice; and creating peace through international anti-imperialist solidarity. Applicants must have participated in activities in the US, and there is a strong preference for applicants who plan on working in this country.

The maximum grant available from the Davis-Putter Scholarship Fund is \$10,000 per year (from July 1 through June 30). Depending on the criteria for each one, the university awards are open to any graduate or undergraduate student or researcher in any field of studies, whose project contributes to the understanding and acceptance of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or intersex (LGBTI) people and their concerns. These fields include but are not limited to arts, letters, social and other sciences, and professional schools. Projects in your application may include dissertations, theses, publications, literary or artistic works, etc.

The Awards Committees of the participating universities set the deadlines and judge the applications on the basis of three basic criteria: 1) your academic dossier, including your grades; 2) the relevance of your topic to the specific award criteria, the LGBTI community and human rights generally; 3) the overall merit of the proposal, including the potential for publication or other means of disseminating knowledge.

For some awards, prior LGBTI community involvement, including as a “straight ally,” may be considered an asset.
